Pre-Reading

- 1. Read the article on the U.S. Drug War ("Marijuana becomes focus of drug war"). You can find a link to this article on my website. Be able to summarize the important points in this article.
- 2. Look up and be able to explain the following words:
 - a) intoxication, intoxicant, to intoxicate
 - b) toxin, toxic
 - c) hallucination, to hallucinate
 - d) taboo
 - e) to get high, to be high ("... to change the subjective experience of reality we call consciousness." p.114)
 - f) counterculture
 - g) the sixties
- 3. Scan the chapter, finding and underlining the following words: obscures, prevailed, universal, yielded, to activate, to endure, destiny, domestication, underrated, banal, profound, suspending, induce

Comprehension (Answer twenty)

- 1. What do you think Pollan means, on p.113, by "... yet drawing a bright line through the middle of the garden, as the God of Genesis found, doesn't always work?" Why not (Why doesn't it always work?)
- 2. On p. 116, the bottom paragraph includes many examples of different animal behaviors. What do these examples show? Explain the main idea of this paragraph, in your own words.
- 3. The section that runs from p.118 p.120 is primarily concerned with
 - a. how pretty plants are
 - b. the history of gardens
 - c. witches
 - d. biblical references to gardens
- 4. Summarize in 2-3 sentences Pollan's "marijuana-growing story" (p.124)
- 5. Explain the "sea change" Pollan refers to on p.125. What changed? From what to what?
- 6. In the main paragraph on p.126 ("The swiftness of this change," the topic sentence is *not* the first one. Which sentence in this paragraph expresses the author's main idea here?
- 7. What changed for marijuana growers in the early 1980s, and why? What were the results of this change?
- 8. Find the following sentence on the bottom of p.135: "Whether cloning is such a *boon* for the species as a whole is, as the story of the apple suggest, much less certain." From this context, what do you think 'boon' means? What is the uncertainty referred to? Explain.
- 9. Why was it hard for Pollan to find a marijuana grower who would show him his (or her) garden? (p.136)
- 10. Describe in your own words the indoor garden Pollan visits.
- 11. p.139: "What this suggests is that the desire to alter one's experience of consciousness may be universal. Do you agree? Why or why not?
- 12. Discuss the role of intoxication, or consciousness-changing, in your culture.
- 13. p.142: "All these plants are . . . better than those who don't." Do you agree? Why or why not?
- 14. Explain the connection Pollan discusses between religion and psychoactive (consciousnesschanging) drugs.
- 15. In your own words, explain what the research of Mechoulam and Howlett has showed us about the brain and how it functions.
- 16. Why does Pollan describe the Chinese character for 'hemp' (p.157)?
- 17. On p.157, Pollan states that "hemp was one of humankind's main sources of paper and cloth" *until the 20th century*. Why is it no longer one of our primary sources? What changed?
- 18. What does Pollan mean when he says, on p.160, that "forgetting is vastly underrated?" How is this related to his point here?
- 19. On pp.160-161 Pollan catalogs (or tries to) *all* of his sensory input at a given moment. Write your own catalog of sensory input. (About 150 words. Freewrite.)
- 20. On pp.165-168, Pollan's main point is that
 - a. he is not good at noticing details, and smoking marijuana makes him worse.
 - b. the things people talk about when they are high are usually silly, and that's why people make jokes about them.
 - c. the things people talk about when they are high may seem silly, but they may also lead to some profound and significant ideas.
- 21. Give an example (your own, or Pollan's in your own words) of an instance where "thoughts can also induce chemical reactions." (p.171)
- 22. When and why did cannabis begin to be considered, or discussed as, medicine?
- 23. Pollan pulls his ideas together in the final paragraph of this chapter. What is his main point?
