

3. If the sentence is a yes/no question, raise your voice at the end of the sentence. Notice that the yes/no question is the only time you raise your voice at the end of the sentence. A yes/no question is a question which you must answer using either "yes" or "no".

Examples. Please listen to the tape and repeat.

1. Are you a student in this class?
2. Do I have to buy a book for this class?
3. Is this level three?
4. Are my children allowed to play in this park?
5. Does Mission Campus have a bookstore?
6. Did you find room 304 all right?
7. Are all of the teachers in this school trained?
8. Was the last class you took difficult?
9. Were all the dishes washed?
10. Doesn't Steven miss his friends and relatives?

4. If a question contains the word "or" expressing a choice between two things, drop your voice at the end of the sentence. A question containing "or" is another type of information question, since you answer it by giving information rather than by saying "yes" or "no".

Examples. Please listen to the tape and repeat.

1. Is this classroom full or not?
2. Does Mission Campus have mostly Chinese or Spanish speakers?
3. Do you enjoy movies or sports?
4. Was the football game interesting or dull?
5. Are the classrooms in good shape or do they need remodeling?
6. Were all the coffee cups broken in the earthquake or are some okay?
7. Am I right or am I wrong?
8. Will the teacher return my homework today or tomorrow?
9. Do you speak Mandarin or Cantonese?
10. Do your classmates speak Portuguese or Spanish?
