Student Speakers Reflect Diversity of City College

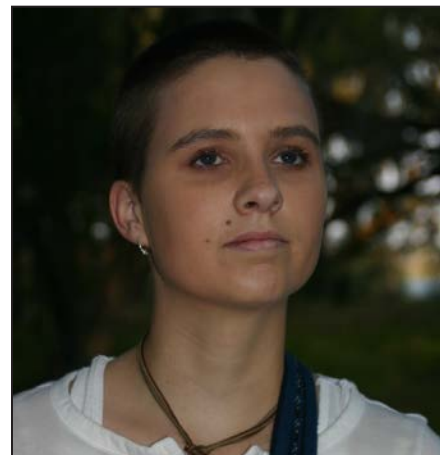

Mental Health Certificate Program Honored by the City

The **Community Mental Health Certificate Peer Program** of the Health Education Department was awarded a commendation from the San Francisco Mental Health Board in April.

Accepting the award at City Hall on May 9 was **Sal Núñez, PhD, LMFT**, Licensed Clinical Psychologist, Director, Community Mental Health Certificate Program, and Coordinator, Peer Care Management Unit.

The commendation was granted for the "Exceptional Training of Mental Health Workers."

Students Advocate for Others

According to a resolution dated March 14 from the Office of **Mayor Ed Lee**, the program was honored because it "empowers students to use their experiences to advocate for others; students develop certain skills to keep their mental illness manageable so they can be self reliant and live independently; students are encouraged to develop employment skills needed to become gainfully employed; the program creates a very conducive learning environment fostering a person's strengths to help students restore their health and wellness; students develop their own recovery methods that speak to their cultures; a team of graduates, the Peer Care Management team, helps new in-coming students acclimate to the program."

The instructors have so much knowledge to share and are very supportive. It has truly changed my life. It has given me a chance to participate in life in ways I never could have without it."

The Community Mental Health Certificate

The Community Mental Health Certificate is a 16-unit program designed to train individuals as front-line behavioral/mental health workers. The program is based in the wellness and recovery model in mental health and is funded by the San Francisco Department of Public Health, Mental Health Services Act.

Led by Dr. Sal Nunez and housed in the Health Education Department at the Ocean Campus, the program was launched two years ago. Forty per cent of the first graduating class were employed upon graduation and 20 per cent of graduates have been accepted into baccalaureate and graduate programs at the University of California at Berkeley, San Francisco State University, and the California Institute of Integral Studies.

Receives Scholarship

Lerone is also a recipient of the Office of Student Affairs Excellence Award, which is a tribute to the unsung heroes and heroines working at CCSF. He has also received the Fostering Futures Scholarship that recognizes former foster youth, for their academic excellence.

Legislative Update

California State Budget

For a very detailed and informative look at what the State is facing overall in terms of budget issues and, specifically, the complexity facing funding levels for K-14 education, take a look at the [Legislative Analyst Office](#) analysis. They propose an alternative to the Governor's plan which will receive significant discussion next week as the Legislature weighs in on its vision for California's future.

State Community College Budget

An excellent CCC budget update from State Vice-Chancellor of Finance Dan Troy: [May Revise Budget](#)

The quick version:

The deficit in the current year has been lowered from \$179 million to \$125 million. The Governor proposes to use money from ballot initiative, should it pass, to buy down deferrals--\$313 million; we--the Community College System--would like to use it to buy back sections and cuts to categoricals/student services

If the November initiative doesn't pass, not only do we not get the \$313 million, but we get about a 6% cut. The Governor continues his proposal to completely redo FTES funding and block grant categoricals, but the Legislature has not supported these proposals that were introduced in January.

This week both budget subcommittees on education in both houses will be meeting to discuss May Revise proposals. The budget is expected to pass on time--June 15, requiring only a 50% vote. With revenues down, alternatives to the Governor's proposals are limited.

Image Makeover Class gets Clients "Back on Track" for Jobs and Life

Students from CCSF's **Advanced Image Consulting** class culminated this semester with Image Makeover presentations conducted on Goodwill's **Back on Track** clients (BOT).

The three-month long project gave 21 students hands-on experience practicing the skills they've learned that included image assessments, analyzing body types, color analysis, fashion personalities, and wardrobe planning.

The students were charged with providing three looks--business, causal and evening attire that will assist the clients in job interviews, social gatherings and special occasions.

DA Gascon Attends Fashion Show

The Image Makeover Presentation was held at Goodwill at 1500 Mission St. on May 14, 2012. The BOT clients showed up wearing their business attire and modeled for an audience that included City College students, Goodwill clients, staff and a special visit from San Francisco District Attorney, **George Gascon**.

Gascon's office hosted the partnership of **Back on Track** clients and City College **Image Consulting** students by providing \$100 Goodwill Voucher for each Image Consultant to shop for their client at any Goodwill store, and a \$25 Ross gift certificate.

Gascon was pleased to see the partnership with City College, saying, "City College is a community gateway to higher education."

"Along with BOT clients receiving the Image Makeovers, I also wanted the Goodwill's supervisors and someone from the District Attorney's office to also receive an Image Makeover so they can understand the process their clients go through. It gives them a thorough understanding of what we do and want to accomplish," says **Kelly Armstrong**, Image Consulting Instructor.

"The partnership between CCSF and BOT has produced an amazing experience that will be forever valued by the BOT participants, says **Ranon Ross**, Director of *Back on Track* in the DA's office, and also a makeover recipient. **Joanna Hernandez**, Manager of Criminal Justice and Reentry, **Rosa Della Casa**, Director of Human Resources and Staff Specialists, **Sonia Worley**, **Isabel Perez**, **Marie-Claire Balea** also benefited from an Image Makeover.

A Collaborative Effort

Once a week the students would check in with their instructor, noting the challenges they were facing that included scheduling issues, clients not having emails or phones, and missed appointments. After hearing the student's concerns the instructor would contact the Goodwill's Staff Specialists to resolve problems. Therefore, each Image Makeover that was presented was a testament that collaborations can work and the smiles on students' and clients' faces proved that to be true.

Leslie Simon to Receive Peacemaker Award June 1 For Violence Prevention

Leslie Simon, Women's Studies Instructor and Coordinator of **Project SURVIVE** will be awarded the **Raymond Shonholtz Visionary Peacemaker Award** on the June 1.

The award is being given by **Community Boards**, the first and longest-running Public Mediation program in the United States.

The award is in celebration of those in the community who have worked to prevent violence and conflict in neighborhoods throughout San Francisco. Leslie Simon is receiving this year's Peace Award for her work helping young people prevent dating and sexual violence.

She developed and now coordinates Project SURVIVE, a peer education program at City College that works to end power abuse in relationships, social groups, and public institutions.

Ryan Schwartz of Community Boards says, "We are highlighting Leslie's work and the promising role of peer education in reducing violence and conflict."

In 2006, she helped create **Expect Respect SF**, which brings youth-friendly presentations about healthy relationship and dating violence to all San Francisco public high schools. Each year, these programs help over 7,000 students avoid abuse and build relationships based on respect and trust.

The award will be presented at a June 1 luncheon catered by The City Club of San Francisco. There will also be a keynote address by the renowned author, mediator, and founder of *Mediators Beyond Borders*, **Kenneth Cloke**.

Founded 'Poetry for the People'

Simon has taught at City College since 1975, when she founded **Poetry for the People**, a class as well as a publishing collective.

For many years she taught **Women in the Arts, Women and Literature**, and **Contemporary Women Writers and Poets at CCSF**.

She also taught in the Women's Studies Department at San Francisco State University and chaired the Women's Studies Department at City College for nine years (2001-2010).

Simon coordinated the UCSF Rape Prevention Education Program in the late 80s. In 1993, she founded Project SURVIVE, and Expect Respect SF in 2006.

A published Poet and Writer

A poet and writer, Simon has published *Jazz/is* for white girls, too (*Poetry for the People*), *i rise/you riz/we born* (*Artaud's Elbow*), and other books, some co-authored with other writers.

She co-founded (with Ann Wettrich and Sharin Pollak) **Groundswell**, currently a program of the CCSF Interdisciplinary Studies Department dedicated to popularizing the building and design arts. Its most recent

project is the Cloud Hall Reading Garden, where the annual "Speak to Me: Poetry from Survivors" convenes every October.

Simon grew up on the South Side of Chicago. She has a B.A. from the University of Michigan, an M.A. from UCLA, and a second M.A. from UC Berkeley. She has a daughter who is a social worker, a son who is a city planner, and one grandson.

ESL Student 1st in State CATESOL Community College Essay Contest

For the second time since its inception*, a City College ESL student has won the statewide Community College Essay Contest, sponsored by Oxford University Press, with Oxford Educational Specialist Rob Walters presenting the Award to Perry Udom, an Administration of Justice major at CCSF. The event took place at the CATESOL Conference held at the Oakland Marriott in April.

Professor Anthony Halderman of Cuesta College and Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo selected Perry's winning essay from a field of submissions from California's 109 various community colleges.

American Dream

Perry's essay focused on his American Dream of one day working for the FBI or CIA as a James Bond-type investigator protecting his country from acts of terrorism. To that end, Perry places much importance on developing top-drawer communication skills.

"The English language was always somewhat difficult to learn even though I was born in the United States," Perry wrote in his essay. "To progress with my writing skills, I must be capable of using correct grammar, punctuation, and wording."

At the time of the Essay Contest, Perry was enrolled in ESL 85, a Grammar Review class for high-level students, and English 96, taught by Professor H. Brown Miller.

Professor Miller has commented favorably on Perry's penchant for creative writing. And Perry reports with delight that the students in his class had been contemplating the inspirational work of Alice Walker and the renowned Vietnamese Zen-Buddhist monk, Thich Nhat Hanh.

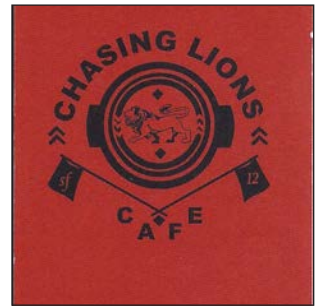

Here's an excerpt from Earth Sciences:

Zann Cannon Goff: *On the first Saturday, soon we were taunted with packages of different flavored cream-filled cookies in front of us, with orders to not eat them. The class was Katryn Wiese's Geology of San Francisco. The cookies that were taunting us were really just a learning tool, and a brilliantly simple method at that: We pulled apart cookies and bulldozed the cream from one side to the other, in an effort to grasp the concept of **accretion**.*

"I'm so grateful to Ms. Wright for teaching us about the media and how to write a press release, says **Victoria Lau**, one of the contest winners."

"I'm so deeply honored that I was acknowledged by City College, Goodwill and the DA's office because they are doing work that impact people's lives when they need it most. I know what it is like to face challenges as a young person, having both my parents die at a young age and having to grow up quickly raising my siblings and my daughter as a divorcee," says Wright.

The program highlight was **Hugo Ortiz**, a BOT Alum who shared, "When you are getting a second chance, like Back on Track-- this chance is not only being given to you but also to your kids, for you are now representing them and working for their future." Ortiz told the audience a Native American saying that had inspired him: "It is good to have thunder in your voice, but it is ten times better to have lightning in your hand and use it."

Back on Track was created in 2003 by District Attorney **Kamala D. Harris**. It is a unique public-private initiative focused on offering workforce development alternatives, educational opportunities and support services for young adult drug sales offenders who have pled guilty to a felony and would otherwise face incarceration if not enrolled in this program. BOT helps qualifying offenders successfully move out of the criminal justice system as they gain life and workplace skills, maintain steady employment, and make contributions to their local communities.

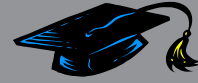

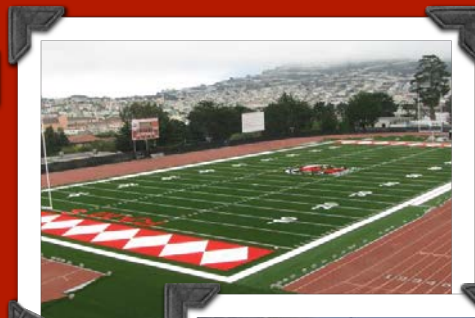

Do you have a retirement savings “gap”?

And does it matter if you do? It certainly does matter if you are concerned about your financial future. A retirement savings gap is the difference between how much you will need to fund a secure retirement and what your current rate of savings is projected to reach. Many people don't know where to begin to determine these figures – so here's a hint. Your VALIC financial advisor can work through the process with you. Save big, save small: it all adds up

One way to close the retirement savings gap is to give up on the winning-the-lottery strategy and save those dollars. Contribute more to your workplace retirement plan. Early retirement vs. delayed vs. semi

“I want to retire at 55.” It's a good thought, but will you have enough saved to last for 30 years or more? It's a given that the sooner you retire, the more your retirement will cost. If you work longer, not only do you contribute more to your retirement account, but you also give your savings more time to work for you. If you start taking Social Security payments early at age 62, your monthly amount will be lowered forever – no “bump up” later on when you reach your age for full benefits. Some people also enjoy the mental stimulation and sense of purpose that going to work each day imparts.

Some ages to remember

As you journey toward retirement, there are age milestones where certain benefit possibilities begin.

- **Age 50** – You may begin **catch-up contributions** to your workplace retirement plan (if you have undercontributed in prior years)
- **Age 59½** – **No more 10% federal tax penalty** on withdrawals from 403(b), 401(k) or 401(a) retirement accounts
- **Age 62** – The minimum age to receive **Social Security** benefits (The age for full benefits depends on your birth year.)
- **Age 65** – You are eligible for **Medicare**
- **Age 70½** – You must start taking **minimum withdrawals** from most retirement accounts if you are no longer working for the employer, or pay a hefty tax penalty

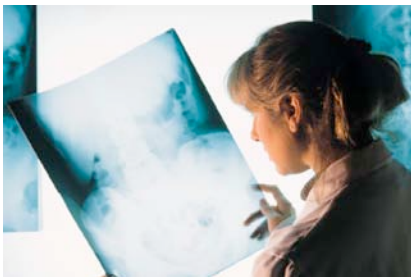
