RESEARCH INTERESTS:

History, politics of the race, gender and sexuality splits in the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s which led to separatist organizing, identity politics and the multiple marginalization of queer people of color in their ethnic communities and the predominantly white queer community. History and politics of current marginalized communities of racial, gender and sexual minorities in the U.S. today, especially issues of identity, community formation, organization building in national and transnational contexts of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders.

Socio-cultural aspects of health and wellness, especially Asian and Pacific Islander (A/PI) people in the U.S., including gay men, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, queer and questioning people. Special interest include: culture, sexuality and stigma; improving the coping mechanisms available to A/PI families dealing with homosexuality, transgenderism and/or HIV+ status of a family member.

Health and wellness of women in the U.S., particularly lesbians of color. Special interests include: sexual violence (rape, incest, assault, domestic violence) and its effects on self and relationships with others; self-healing from sexual violence and the socio-cultural aspects of intimate partner relationships for lesbian women across the life span. Healing through energy medicine: Hindu chakra system; psychic healing; Buddhist meditation practice; applied kinesiology/muscle testing; bioenergetic repatterning; mind-body-spirit connection; self-healing from trauma (specifically violence) through energy medicine.
